Report on the Financial Statements

I have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Housing Authority of the City of Grambling (the authority) as of and for the year ended September 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements, which comprise the Authority's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that I plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, I express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinions.

Opinions

In my opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly in all material respects, the respective financial position of the Housing Authority of the City of Grambling as of September 30, 2013, and the respective changes in net financial position and cash flows, thereof for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the Management's discussion and analysis as listed in the table of contents be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. I have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to my inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge I obtained during my audit of the basic financial statements. I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

My audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the authority's basic financial statements. The Financial Data Schedule is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. The Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is also not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The Financial Data Schedule and the Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In my opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

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The Schedule of Compensation of Board Members has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements, and accordingly, I do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, I have also issued my report dated February 25, 2014 on my consideration of the authority's internal control over financial reporting and on my tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of my testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the authority's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS (MD&A)

SEPTEMBER 30, 2013

The management of Public Housing Authority of Grambling, Louisiana presents the following discussion and analysis (MD&A) of the Housing Authority's financial activities for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2013. This represents an overview of financial information. Please read this discussion and analysis in conjunction with the Authority's included audited financial statements.

IMPACT OF RECENTLY ISSUED ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In June, 2011, the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) issued Statement 63, Financial Reporting of Deferred Outflows of Resources, Deferred Inflows of Resources, and Net Position. GASB 63 provides guidance for reporting deferred outflows of resources, deferred inflows of resources, and net position in a statement of financial position and includes five components: assets, deferred outflows of resources (none applies to this Housing Authority this year), liabilities, deferred inflows of resources (none applies to this Housing Authority this year), and a residual amount, referred to as the net position. The provisions of this Statement are now effective and apply to these financial statements.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- The primary source of funding for these activities continues to be subsidies and grants from the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), whereas tenant rentals provide a secondary but also significant source of funding.
- The Housing Authority's assets exceeded its liabilities by \$2,494,365 at the close of the fiscal year ended 2013.
 - ✓ Of this amount \$2,014,760 represents a restriction equal to the net amount invested in land, buildings, furnishings, leasehold improvements, equipment, and construction in progress, minus associated debts.
 - ✓ Also of this amount, \$22,372 of net position is restricted for the Housing Choice Voucher program
 - ✓ The remainder of \$457,233 of unrestricted assets could be used to meet the Housing Authority's ongoing obligations. As a measure of financial strength, this amount equals 78% of the total operating expenses of \$588,293 for the fiscal year 2013, which means the Authority might be able to operate about 9 months using the unrestricted assets alone, compared to 6 months in the prior fiscal year.
- The Housing Authority's total net position decreased by \$171,981, a 7% decrease from the prior fiscal year 2012. This decrease is attributable to decreases in Federal grants for both operations and capital improvements, described in more detail below.
- The decrease in net position of these funds was accompanied by an increase in unrestricted cash by \$95,959 from fiscal year 2012, primarily due to spending \$84,956 more for operations than Federal funds received for operations.
- The Authority spent \$11,055 on capital asset additions and \$102,815 on construction in progress during the current fiscal year.
- These changes led to a decrease in total assets by \$169,796 and an increase in total liabilities by \$23,969. As related measure of financial health, there are still over \$8 of current assets covering each dollar of total current liabilities, which compares to \$11 covering the prior fiscal year's liabilities.
- The Housing Authority continues to operate without the need for debt borrowing.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This MD&A is intended to serve as an introduction to the Housing Authority's basic financial statements. The Housing Authority is a special-purpose government engaged in business-type activities. Accordingly, only fund financial statements are presented as the basic financial statements, comprised of two components: (1) fund financial statements and (2) a series of notes to the financial statements. These provide information about the activities of the Housing Authority as a whole and present a longer-term view of the Housing Authority's finances. This report also contains other supplemental information in addition to the basic financial statements themselves demonstrating how projects funded by HUD have been completed, and whether there are inadequacies in the Authority's internal controls.

Reporting on the Housing Authority as a Whole

One of the most important questions asked about the Authority's finances is, "Is the Housing Authority as a whole better off, or worse off, as a result of the achievements of fiscal year 2013?" The Statement of net position and the Statement of Revenues, Expenses, and Changes in Net Position report information about the Housing Authority as a whole and about its activities in a way that helps answer this question. These statements include all assets and liabilities using the accrual basis of accounting, which is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies. All of the current year's revenues and expenses are taken into account regardless of when cash is received or paid.

Fund Financial Statements

The Housing Authority accounts for all financial activity in a single enterprise fund. A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Housing Authority, like other enterprises operated by state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

The Housing Authority's financial statements report its net position and changes in net position. One can think of the Housing Authority's net position – the difference between assets and liabilities – as one way to measure the Authority's financial health, or financial position. Over time, increases and decreases in the Authority's net position are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. One will need to consider other non-financial factors, however, such as the changes in the Authority's occupancy levels or its legal obligations to HUD, to assess the overall health of the Housing Authority.

USING THIS ANNUAL REPORT

The Housing Authority's annual report consists of financial statements that show combined information about the Housing Authority's most significant programs:

The Housing Authority's auditors provided assurance in their independent auditors' report with which this MD&A is included, that the basic financial statements are fairly stated. The auditors provide varying degrees of assurance regarding the other information included in this report. A user of this report should read the independent auditors' report carefully to determine the level of assurance provided for each of the other parts of this report.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

The Housing Authority's net position was \$2,494,365 as of September 30, 2013. Of this amount, \$2,014,760 was invested in capital assets, and the remaining \$457,233 was unrestricted. There were \$22,372 in specific assets restricted Housing Choice Voucher (HCV) program.

EXPLANATIONS OF FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

Compared with the prior fiscal year, total operating and non-operating revenues decreased \$13,318, or by 1%, from a combination of larger offsetting factors. Reasons for most of this change are listed below:

- Total tenant revenue increased by \$14,488, or by 13%, from that of the prior fiscal year, due to the amount of
 rent each tenant pays which is based on a sliding scale of their personal income. Some tenants' personal
 incomes increased, so rent revenue from these tenants increased accordingly, raising the overall total. In
 contrast, other tenant revenues (such as fees collected from tenants for late payment of rent, damages to their
 units, and other assessments) decreased by \$456, or by 6%.
- Federal revenues from HUD for operations increased by \$143,006, or by 29%, from that of the prior fiscal year. The determination of operating grants is based in part upon operations performance of prior years. This amount fluctuates from year-to-year because of the complexities of the funding formula HUD employs. Generally, this formula calculates an allowable expense level adjusted for inflation, occupancy, and other factors, and then uses this final result as a basis for determining the grant amount. The amount of rent subsidy received from HUD depends upon an eligibility scale of each tenant. There was an increase in the number of eligible tenants receiving subsidies, so Housing Assistance Grants increased accordingly.
- Federal Capital Funds from HUD decreased by \$169,818, or by 62%, from that of the prior fiscal year. The Housing Authority was still in the process of completing projects funded from grants by HUD for fiscal years 2009 through 2012, and submitted a new grant during this current fiscal year.
- Total other non-operating revenue decreased by \$1,205, or by 4%, from that of the prior fiscal year, due to a decrease in portability HAP reimbursements and administrative fees earned.
- Interest income totaling \$262, did not change significantly from the prior to the current year.

Compared with the prior fiscal year, total operating and non-operating expenses increased \$71,063, or by 7%, but this also was made up of a combination of offsetting factors. Again, reasons for most of this change are listed below:

- Depreciation expense increased by \$4,996, or by 2%, from that of the prior fiscal year, because there was an increase in capital assets by \$113,870.
- Maintenance and repairs increased by \$17,540, or by 15%, from that of the prior fiscal year, due to several factors: Repair staff wages decreased by \$12,930, and related employee benefit contributions decreased by \$3,167. Materials used increased by \$21,034, and contract labor costs decreased by \$3,316. In addition, Extraordinary maintenance increased by \$15,920 from that of the prior fiscal year.
- General Expenses increased by \$4,321, or by 6%, from that of the prior fiscal year, and payments in lieu of taxes (PILOT) increased by \$1,152, or by 13%. PILOT is calculated as a percentage of rent minus utilities which, therefore, changed proportionately to the changes in each of these. Insurance premiums decreased by \$1,733, or by 4%, since property and casualty insurance premiums decreased. Whereas, other general expenses increased by \$5,372, or by 57%. Lastly, bad debts increased by \$3,217, and compensated absences decreased by \$3,686, or by 32%.

- Administrative Expenses decreased by \$3,949, or by 2%, from that of the prior fiscal year, due to a combination
 of offsetting factors: Administrative staff salaries increased by \$484, or by 0%, and related employee benefit
 contributions increased by \$831, or by 3% therefore, total staff salaries and benefit costs increased by 1%. In
 addition, audit fees increased by \$602, staffs' training/travel reimbursements decreased by \$6,379, office
 expenses decreased by \$20, and sundry expenses increased by \$534; therefore, other staff administrative
 expense decreased by 7%.
- Housing Assistance Payments to landlords increased by \$44,861, or by 11%, from that of the prior fiscal year, because there was an increase in the number of tenants housed during the year.
- Utilities Expense increased by \$3,424, or by 30%, from that of the prior fiscal year, due to numerous cumulative factors: Water cost increased by \$532, due to an increase in consumption by over 100%; electricity cost increased by \$1,092, due to an increase in consumption by 3%; gas cost increased by \$483, due to an increase in consumption by 3%; gas cost increased by \$483, due to an increase in consumption by 88%; and finally, other utilities expense (such as labor, benefits, garbage, sewage, and waste removal) increased by \$1,801.
- Tenant services, totaling \$1,396, did not change significantly from the prior to the current year.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At September 30, 2013, the Housing Authority had a total cost of \$6,289,411 invested in a broad range of assets and construction in progress from projects funded in 2009 through 2012, listed below. This amount, not including depreciation, represents increases of \$113,870 from the prior year. More detailed information about capital assets appears in the notes to the financial statements.

As of the end of the 2013 fiscal year, the Authority is still in the process of completing HUD grants of \$495,503 obtained during 2009 through 2012 fiscal years. A total remainder of \$130,120 will be received and \$49,349 will be spent for completing these projects during fiscal year 2014.

Debt

Non-current liabilities also include accrued annual vacation leave due to employees. The Housing Authority has not incurred any mortgages, leases, or bond indentures for financing capital assets or operations.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS AND RATES

The Housing Authority is primarily dependent upon HUD for the funding of operations; therefore, the Housing Authority is affected more by Federal budget than by local economic conditions. The capital budgets for the 2014 fiscal year have already been submitted to HUD for approval and no major changes are expected.

The Capital fund programs are multiple year budgets and have remained relatively stable. Capital Funds are used for the modernization of public housing properties including administrative fees involved in the modernization.

Grambling, Louisiana Notes to the Basic Financial Statements September 30, 2013

NOTE A – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES The accompanying basic financial statements of the authority have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

(1) <u>Reporting Entity</u>

The Housing Authority of The City of Grambling (the authority) was chartered as a public corporation under the laws of the State of Louisiana for the purpose of providing safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations for the residents of the City of Grambling, Louisiana. This formation was contingent upon the approval of the city.

The authority is governed by a Board of Commissioners (Board), which is composed of five members appointed by the city and serve five-year staggered terms. The Board of the authority exercises all powers granted to the authority.

GASB Statement No. 14 established criteria for determining the governmental reporting entity. Under provisions of this statement, the authority is considered a primary government, since it is a special purpose government that has a separately elected governing body, is legally separate, and is fiscally independent of other state and local governments. As used in GASB 14, fiscally independent means that the authority may, without the approval or consent of another governmental entity, determine or modify its own budget, control collection and disbursements of funds, maintain responsibility for funding deficits and operating deficiencies, and issue bonded debt. The authority has no component units, defined by GASB 14 as other legally separate organizations for which the elected authority members are financially accountable.

The authority is a related organization of the City of Grambling, Louisiana since the city appoints a voting majority of the authority's governing board. The city is not financially accountable for the authority as it cannot impose its will on the authority and there is no potential for the authority to provide financial benefit to, or impose financial burdens on, the city. Accordingly, the authority is not a component unit of the financial reporting entity of the city.

(2) <u>Funds</u>

The accounts of the authority are organized and operated on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purpose and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions. The minimum number of funds is maintained consistent with legal and managerial requirements.

All funds of the authority are classified as proprietary. The general fund accounts for transactions of all of the authority's programs.

Proprietary funds distinguish *operating* revenues and expenses from *nonoperating* items. Operating revenues and expenses generally result from providing services and producing and delivering goods in connection with a proprietary fund's principal ongoing operations. The principal operating revenues of the authority's enterprise fund are HUD operating grants and subsidies, Section 8 Housing Assistance Subsidies, Section 8 Management Fees and tenant dwelling rents. Operating expenses include Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments, General and Administrative expenses, repairs and maintenance expenses, utilities and depreciation and amortization on capital assets. All revenues and expenses.

The accompanying basic financial statements of the authority have been prepared in conformity with governmental accounting principles generally accepted in the Unites States of America. The GASB is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The accompanying basic financial statements have been prepared in conformity with GASB statement No. 34. Basic Financial Statements and Managements discussion and Analysis—for State and Local Governments, which was unanimously approved in June 1999 by the GASB.

(3) Measurement focus and basis of accounting

Proprietary finds are accounted for on the flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time the liabilities are incurred. With this management focus all assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of these funds are included on the statement of net positions.

(4) Assets, liabilities, and net Position

(a) Deposits

The authority's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits, and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition. HUD regulations, state law and the authority's investment policy allow the housing authority to invest in collateralized certificates of deposit and securities backed by the federal government.

(b) Inventory and prepaid items

All inventories are valued at cost on a first-in first-out (FIFO) basis. Inventories consist of expendable building materials and supplies held for consumption in the course of the authority's operations.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items.

(c) Restricted Assets

Cash equal to the amount of tenant security deposits, Housing Assistance Payment reserves and interest due HUD are reflected as restricted.

(d) Capital assets

Capital assets of the authority are included in the statement of net positions and are recorded at actual cost. The capitalization threshold is \$500. Depreciation of all exhaustible fixed assets is charged as an expense against operations.

Property, plant, and equipment of the Authority is depreciated using the straight line method over the following estimated useful lives:

Buildings	33 years
Modernization and improvements	15 years
Furniture and equipment	3-7 years

(e) Due from/to other governments or agencies

Amounts due from/to the authority to/by other governments or agencies are generally for grants or programs under which the services have been provided by the authority. The authority also records an amount due to the various taxing districts within the region for payments in lieu of taxes.

(f) Allowance for doubtful accounts

The authority provides an allowance for doubtful accounts, as needed, for accounts deemed not collectible. At September 30, 2013, the management of the authority established an allowance for doubtful accounts of approximately \$13,129.

(g) Compensated absences

It is the authority's policy to permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation pay benefits. In accordance with the provisions of GASB Statement No. 16, "*Accounting for Compensated Absences*," vacation pay is accrued when incurred and reported as a liability.

Employees earn from 98 to 192 annual leave hours per year and may accumulate an unlimited number of annual leave hours. Employees receive payment for up to 300 annual leave hours upon termination or retirement at their then current rate of pay. However, one employee, per written contract, shall be paid for all accumulated annual leave upon separation from employment with the authority. The cost of current leave privileges, computed in accordance with GASB Codification Section C60 is recognized as a current year expense when leave is earned.

(h) Restricted net Position

Net positions are reported as restricted when constraints placed on net positions use are either:

Externally imposed by creditors (such as debt covenants), grantors, contributors or laws or regulations of other governments or imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Restricted resources are used first when an expense is incurred for purposes for which both restricted and unrestricted resources are available.

(i) Use of estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the government-wide financial statements and reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

NOTE B – DEPOSITS

Deposits are stated at cost, which approximates fair value. Under state law and/or federal regulation, these deposits, or the resulting bank balances, must be in Federal Securities, secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of federal securities. The fair value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent.

As of September 30, 2013, the authority's carrying amount of deposits was \$463,654, which includes the following:

Interest Rate Risk—The authority's policy does not address interest rate risk.

Credit Rate Risk—Since all of the authority's deposits are federally insured and/or backed by federal securities, the authority does not have credit rate risk.

Custodial Credit Risk—This is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the authority's deposits may not be returned to it. The authority does not have a policy for custodial credit risk. \$252,649 of the authority's total deposits were covered by federal depository insurance, and do not have custodial credit risk. The remaining \$243,451 of deposits have custodial credit risk, but were collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution trust department or agent. The bank balances at September 30, 2013 totaled \$496,100.

NOTE D – CONSTRUCTION COMMITMENTS

The authority is engaged in a modernization program and has entered into construction type contracts with approximately \$106,910 remaining until completion.

NOTE E – COMPENSATED ABSENCES

At September 30, 2013, employees of the authority have accumulated and vested \$31,172 of employee leave benefits, which was computed in accordance with GASB Codification Section C60. The leave payable is recorded in the accompanying financial statements. \$27,195 is reported in long-term debt.

NOTE F – LONG TERM OBLIGATIONS

As of September 30, 2013, long term obligations consisted of compensated absences in the amount of \$27,195. The following is a summary of the changes in the long term obligations for the year ended September 30, 2013.

NOTE G – POST EMPLOYMENT RETIREMENT BENEFITS

The authority does not provide any post employment retirement benefits. Therefore the authority does not include any entries for unfunded actuarial accrued liability, net OPEB expense, or annual contribution required.

NOTE H - RETIREMENT PLAN

The authority participates in the Housing Agency Retirement Trust plan, administered by Mercer, which is a defined contribution plan. The plan consists of employees of various local and regional housing authorities, urban renewal agencies, and other similar organizations. Through this plan, the authority provides pension benefits for all of its full-time employees. All regular and fulltime employees are eligible to participate in the plan on the first day of the month after completing six months of continuous and uninterrupted employment. Plan provisions and changes to the plan contributions are determined by the Board of the authority.

Under a defined contribution plan, benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan plus investment earnings. The employer is required to make monthly contributions equal to 7.5 percent of each participant's basic (excludes overtime) compensation. Employees are required to contribute 5.5 percent of their annual covered salary.

HOUSING AUTHORITY OF THE CITY OF GRAMBLING GRAMBLING, LOUISIANA Notes to the Financial Statements, 2013 - continued

The authority's contribution for each employee and income allocated to the employee's account are fully vested after five years of continuous service. The authority's contributions and interest forfeited by employees who leave employment before five years of service are used to offset future contributions of the authority.

Normal retirement date shall be the first day of the month following the employee's sixty-fifth birthday or after ten years of participation in the plan.

The authority's total payroll for the year ended September 30, 2013, was \$122,163. The authority's contributions were calculated using the base salary amount of \$92,148. The authority made the required contributions of \$6,908 for the year ended September 30, 2013.

NOTE I – RISK MANAGEMENT

The authority is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, and destruction of assets; errors and omissions, injuries to employees; and natural disasters. The authority's risk management program encompasses obtaining property and liability insurance.

The authority transfers risk of loss by participating in a public entity risk pool and contracting with a commercial insurance carrier for all major categories of exposed risk.

This includes coverage of property, general liability, public liability, and workers compensation. The risk pool and insurance contracted are obligated to meet settlements up to the maximum coverage, after the authority's deductions are met.

There has been no significant reduction in insurance coverages from coverages in the prior year. In addition, there have been no significant claims that have exceeded commercial insurance coverages in any of the past three fiscal years.

NOTE J – FEDERAL COMPLIANCE CONTINGENCIES

The authority is subject to possible examinations by federal regulators who determine compliance with terms, conditions, laws and regulations governing grants given to the entity in the current and prior years. These examinations may result in required refund by the entity to federal grantors and/or program beneficiaries. The authority is subject to HUD's consideration of reducing grants in order to have the authority utilize authority Equity to fund expenses.

NOTE K – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Events that occur after the balance sheet date but before the financial statements were issued must be evaluated for recognition or disclosure. The effects of subsequent events that provide evidence about conditions that existed at the balance sheet date are recognized in the accompanying financial statements. Subsequent events, which provide evidence about conditions that existed after the balance sheet date, require disclosure in the accompanying notes. Management evaluated the activity of the authority through February 25, 2014 and concluded that no subsequent events have occurred that would require recognition in the financial statements or disclosure in the notes to the financial statements.

NOTE L – ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

Statement of Financial Accounting Standard (SFAS) No. 14 requires disclosure in financial statements of a situation where one entity provides more than 10% of the audited entity's revenues. The Department of Housing and Urban Development provided \$742,106 to the authority, which represents approximately 83% of the authority's total revenue for the year.
